Dear Community Members,

The *Guilford County Youth Supportive Services Resource Directory* is a comprehensive list of community agencies in Guilford County which offer programs and services to youth and their families for a wide range of needs. This resource directory has been created to be used by parents and youth service providers (such as school administration and teachers, social workers, guidance counselors, and school resource officers) to make referrals for youth and families with unmet needs.

Many of the services listed originated from United Way's 2-1-1 Information Referral database. This resource directory was originally developed by the Resource and Needs Subcommittee of the Guilford County Disproportionate Minority Contact Project (DMC). DMC is a community initiative focused on identifying ways we can reduce the number of African American youth entering the juvenile justice system. A grant that supported the DMC initiative was awarded to the UNCG Center for Youth, Family, and Community Partnerships through the North Carolina Department of Crime Control & Public Safety, Governor's Crime Commission.

Currently, this directory is updated and maintained by the Guilford Education Alliance and housed on its website www.guilfordeducationalliance.org. Other organizations are encouraged to link it to their websites and to make additional copies of this booklet as needed.

Funds for the printing and distribution have been provided through a grant that Guilford Education Alliance received from American Express.

While the services listed within this directory were current when published, services and contact information listed may become outdated.
